A History of Women's Aid in Scotland – Heritage Project

Volunteer filmmaker

About the project: 2016 marks 40 years since Scottish Women's Aid was created, bringing together a network of local Women's Aid groups active the length and breadth of Scotland. To celebrate and mark this important anniversary, Scottish Women's Aid in partnership with Glasgow Women's Library, University of Glasgow Centre for Gender History and Women's History Scotland, was awarded money by the Heritage Lottery Fund to gather, collect and document the history of Women's Aid in Scotland.

Women's Aid emerged out of the Women's Liberation Movement of the 1970s as a response by some activists who wanted to provide practical support to women who were experiencing violence and abuse. In doing so they created a network of refuges, contributed to policy and legal developments and were influential in helping to change views in Scottish society about the issue of domestic abuse and gender inequality. This project will document these important stories through a collection of oral history interviews, films, the creation of a project website, the digitisation of archival material, a touring exhibition and many more exciting outputs! But to achieve this, we need a group of committed and enthusiastic volunteers

Opportunity description:

We are looking for women who are interested in or would like to develop an interest in women's history. More specifically, this opportunity is open to those who would like to develop interviewing and film-making skills.

What will it involve?

You will be asked to conduct interviews, which will be filmed, with interviewees who have been involved with Women's Aid during its history. As part of this role you are likely to have to travel across Scotland to meet the interviewees to conduct the interviews. In return you will receive all reasonable expenses, comprehensive training on interviewing and the use of recording equipment and on how to use the film equipment, and an induction and support programme from Scottish Women's Aid led by the project co-ordinator Sarah Browne.

How much time will be involved?

It is estimated that each interview will take around about 1 hour and in addition will involve some travel time as well. You are likely to be asked to conduct a minimum of 2 interviews. Interviews will be arranged at a time which is convenient to the interviewee and yourself. In addition training and induction will last a total of 2-3 days. The training and induction session is likely to take place either on 30th April 2016 or 14th May 2016 in Edinburgh. Interviewing and film training will take place during May or June 2016 and as far as possible will be arranged to suit those who have volunteered for this role. You must be able to attend these sessions.

Please note that due to the nature of this project you might find that there are quiet periods in which you are not required to complete any interviewing. The role described above is a voluntary role only, and is not intended to signify a contract of employment between you and Scottish Women's Aid. You will always be free to stop volunteering at any time.

Do I need any particular skills?

No. We are looking for women who have an interest in women's history and who are interested in conducting interviews as part of this process as well as developing film-making skills. Full training will be given as well as information about the project and the history of Women's Aid. However, it would be beneficial if you had an understanding of and commitment to Scottish Women's Aid's vision and mission as a feminist organisation.

What will I gain from this experience?

As well as being able to contribute to this exciting and interesting project, you will gain and/or develop a range of skills:

- Interview technique including listening and asking questions
- Gain knowledge of and confidence using recording equipment
- Gain knowledge about women's history and the history of Women's Aid in Scotland
- Gain a greater understanding of domestic abuse and campaigns against violence against women
- The opportunity to familiarise yourself with the work of the partner organisations
- Become a supporter of the project and be kept up-to-date with the latest developments as well as being invited to attend project activities and outcomes
- To contribute to the development of the project through providing feedback and in contributing to online content
