This vibrant information hub is open to all, and is home to a lending library and archives as well as providing an exciting range of events, activities and courses.

International Women's Day

Celebrating women and equality around the globe

International Women's Day (IWD) is every year on 8 March and GWL celebrates the economic, political and social achievements of women past, present and future over a whole week.

International Women's Week events are detailed in the following pages and have a look at our Out and About pages for activities in other areas of Scotland.

Mapping Monuments to Women Launch Saturday, 10th March all day, Scotland wide.

All over Scotland there are many types of memorials, large and small, commemorating the lives and achievements of women. The stories behind some names are well known; others have been forgotten. All the women have contributed in some way to the life of the country we know today.

In 2011, GWL worked with Women's History Scotland and Girlguiding Scotland on The Big Name Hunt, encouraging girls and young women to explore their local area, record memorials to women and uncover their stories.

The Women of Scotland website was set up to record this information and make it available to all. The Big Name Hunt is now drawing to a close, but many memorials to women remain undocumented, and the website is being opened up to allow everyone to contribute.

Perhaps you know of a memorial to a woman in your area that hasn't been marked on our map? Or maybe you know the story behind a name?

On Saturday 10th March, we want women across Scotland to go out and find the monuments, landmarks, street names and buildings that mark the lives and achievements of women (whether famous, humble or notorious) who have helped to shape Scotland.

GWL staff, volunteers and some of our Women Make History detectives will be on hand and online to help groups locate memorials, and documenting them on the website.



She Settles in the Shields Book Launch Thursday 8th March, 12.30pm to 3pm at the Library, refreshments provided (£3/free)

Join us on International Women's Day to celebrate the lives of migrant women in Glasgow.

She Settles in the Shields tells the story of women who travelled to Pollokshields from all over the world, in search of a new life. Told in their words, the women reveal their experiences of life in their traditional homelands, together with their reasons for leaving, their arrival, first impressions of Scotland and Pollokshields, the feelings of isolation which accompanied migration, and their encounters with work, study and the local community.

It also provides an intimate insight into family, intergenerational differences, and, on a lighter note, into food, fashion, relaxation and celebration.

The GWL Book Group

Glasgow Women's Library Book Group is welcoming and inspiring, connecting women who like reading with each other and to a host of amazing and surprising new reads. The book group is one of the Library's longest running and most popular regular groups, meeting approximately once a month at the GWL space.

Join the Book Group

To become a Book Group member we ask you to do the following:

Contact us to let us know you want to join: our Book Group facilitator will then get in touch with the name of the next book and the date of the next meeting. (If the book group is currently full you will be placed on the waiting list).

In the meantime, if you are not already a Glasgow Women's Library borrower then sign up: there is information on how to do this is the How To Get Involved pages.

Once you are a borrower you can then sign up to the Book Group proper. The cost for a one year membership is £5/£10. Your membership fee helps cover the costs of the Book Group for which we currently do not have another source of funding.

You can attend your first meeting for free to try it out - after this membership is payable and is renewed annually.

The Book Group offers members: the loan of books apart from the occasional self sourced book decided by the group, a welcoming environment, tea and coffee, email updates and group facilitation.

Books are distributed at each meeting to members, with spare copies left for collection in the Library. After reading, books can either be left at the Library, or returned to any Glasgow City Council public library.

This group is free to Friends of GWL.



Satellite & Pop-Up Library Collections

Satellite libraries are remote collections, a "mini women's library" from our Glasgow-based collection, consisting of books, magazines, DVDs and other materials. They can be adapted in size and content to suit a wide range of interests and reading levels and can be installed anywhere in Scotland. We currently have satellite collections in Dumfries, Inverness and Cornton Vale women's prison.

We can also offer temporary 'pop up libraries' to support events or exhibitions. These are a great way to give people a flavour of what we have on offer in the library. We've run pop-up libraries at the Tramway and CCA in Glasgow, and the Generator Projects Art Gallery in Dundee.

Women Make History Workshops

Continuing our popular workhops on women's history (women only).

Curious Learning Programme at St Mungo's Museum Monday 2nd April, 10am to 3pm (free)

In conjunction with St Mungo's Museum, we are running the exciting Curious learning programme designed to increase cultural understanding and celebrate the diverse populations of Glasgow. You will use museum objects to actively explore your own culture, consider other cultures and develop skills and confidence to engage with people from different cultural backgrounds. Curious is supported by Legacy Trust UK and by the National Lottery through Creative Scotland

Body Talk: Women's Health, Body and Mind (free)

This series of events offers women the opportunity to think about different areas of their health. At the events a film, depicting women's lives, is shown, before a group discussion about women's health. This programme includes two events:

Jean Kilbourne's film discussing the impact of media images of women.

Women & Responsibility: "We Need To Talk About Kevin" Monday 21st May 11am to 2.30pm

Scottish director Lynne Ramsay's film about one woman trying to come to terms with her son's actions and the responsibility she feels throughout his upbringing.

Displaced Women: Multilingual narratives of migration in Europe Wednesday 28th to Friday 30th March 2012

This interdisciplinary conference will provide a forum for discussion of the issues facing women who have moved from one culture to another and have adopted in their daily lives and creative work a language other than their 'mother tongue'.

We will look at the creative, linguistic, economic and psychological effects of this displacement. The critical examination of women's narratives in Europe (fiction, poetry, diaries, memoirs, pamphlets), from a literary perspective will be complemented by sessions looking at these issues from a historical, political and sociological perspective.

The broad nature of this conference provides an excellent opportunity for exchange between researchers in different disciplines who do not always have the chance to come together.

Researching Women's History in Clydebank Wednesdays from 25th January, 1pm-3pm, Centre 81, Clydebank

This ongoing course is for local women interested in doing some detective work on women's history in Clydebank. No previous experience or knowledge is necessary to join this friendly, informal group. Why not help create a scrapbook about the history of women in Clydebank and learn how to do research in local libraries and archives. This course is organised with support from Clydebank Housing Association and Community Links Scotland.

Researching Women's History in Dumbarton Friday 24th February 10am to 12pm for 10weeks, in Dumbarton

Would you like to find out more about the suffragettes in Scotland, 'Turkey Red', or the women who worked in the shipyards? Personal History Walks

Violence Against Women: Poster Making (free) Running from January to March 2012

Working with Castlemilk Domestic Abuse project we are consulting various BME women's groups across Glasgow to explore the subject of violence against women within their communities. The information from the consultations will be used to produce posters which inform the local and wider community on the sensitive issues of domestic violence within their communities.

Memories Box Project in Queens Cross

We are working with BME women in Central and West area to create a personal memory box using creative techniques.

The sessions allow women to explore their personal histories and identify items that they already cherish, or would like to place in a memory box.

This project involves a therapeutic process whereby women have a safe space to recall and share their personal experiences and learn about each others culture, customs, traditions and values.

The Learner Forum is a friendly, informal way to meet other learners, have a say in what goes into our programmes, find out about how to get more involved in the life of GWL and help us improve our learning, services and resources. We provide the refreshments - just bring your views and ideas.

Getting the most out of your Library Collection Wednesday 2nd May, 2pm to 4pm (free)

Your library collection needs you! We want our library to have great books that are easy to find, and that our learners and borrowers want to read. Come along to this Learner Forum to find out more about how the library collection works and what it can offer you. Most importantly, let us know what you'd like to see in the library, and how we can improve it to make sure it's a place we all love to use.

Joining and Booking How do I book an event?

To attend an event or course we ask you to join the Library: this is really easy to do and is completely FREE! Just complete a form to receive your borrowers card and we will post this out to you. Forms can be completed online, or you can call in & see us to fill one out. Joining gives you a unique GWL number that you can then use to register on events.

Do I need to pay?

While a lot of our events are free, we do ask for a small contribution towards some of our learning events. Where you see prices listed against an event these generally fall under two categories: Full Price for people who feel that they can afford to pay a small amount to attend events and want to contribute to the library's work, and Subsidised Rates (usually free) for students, people on a low income, unemployed or in receipt of benefits. We do not ask for

proof of this, it is done on a trust basis and you self-evaluate your situation.

GWL Friends can access all our learning programmes for free.

All the money we receive helps us to keep providing events and courses, and directly supports the work of Glasgow Women's Library.

Why is it important to book first?

It is important for us to know how many people to expect at all events as this affects the spaces we use and how many staff and biscuits and teabags we need! It is also important so that we can ensure you have all the details you need about an event, especially if there are any last minute changes. It is also just as important for you to cancel a place in advance if you can't attend as we often have waiting lists. So don't let someone miss out on an event they would have loved to attend, give us a call.
