This vibrant information hub is open to all, and is home to a lending library and archive as well as providing an exciting range of events, activities and courses.

Two Decades of Changing Minds

21 artists and 21 writers celebrate 21 years of Glasgow Women's Library

To mark GWL's work over two decades, we have commissioned 21 of Scotland's foremost women artists and 21 women writers to create new works inspired by items in our library, archive and museum artifact collections.

This second event in our series of anniversary celebrations will showcase the latest artworks and writings to be produced, with readings from participating writers, including Vicki Feaver, Kirsty Logan and Laura Marney, and a performance by artist Ellie Harrison.

Be the first to see and hear the new batch of wonderful, exciting and fresh creations inspired by your favourite Women's Library, and meet some of the creators! Treasures from our collection that have inspired the work will also be on display. Refreshments will be provided.

Reading, sharing and discovering a world of women's writing



Cracking On: Picnic Poetry Wednesday 11th July, 12pm to 2pm (free but booking essential)

Join us for some picnic poetry (weather permitting) in Kelvingrove park with Joy Howard and Grey Hen Press poets from Scotland and the UK, A C Clarke, Margaret Christie, Joy Howard, Eleanor Livingstone, Helena Nelson, Sheila Templeton and Margaret Wood.

Joy Howard founded Grey Hen Press to celebrate the wit and wisdom of women, particularly older women. Since then her much-praised anthologies, including, *A Twist of Malice*, *Cracking On* and *Get Me Out of Here!* have won big audiences with their tough, tender, 'laugh-out-loud funny' take on modern life.

Joy herself has been widely published, and her new collection, *Refurbishment*, came out in 2011.

The readings from Joy and other Grey Hen authors will take place on the back green of An Clachan cafe in Kelvingrove Park (or we also have an indoor location as back up). Bring or buy a sandwich and enjoy a unique and inspiring lunch experience with some positive perspectives on growing older or "Cracking On"

Reading and Readers

Reading, sharing and discovering a world of women's writing

The GWL Book Group

Glasgow Women's Library Book Group is welcoming and inspiring, connecting women who like reading with each other and to a host of amazing and surprising new reads. The book group is one of GWL's longest running and most popular groups, meeting approximately once a month at the GWL space.

Join the Book Group

To become a Book Group member we ask you to do the following:

Contact us to let us know you want to join: our Book Group facilitator will then get in touch with the name of the next book and the date of the next meeting. (If the book group is currently full you will be placed on the waiting list).

In the meantime, if you are not already a Glasgow Women's Library borrower then sign up: there is information on how to do this in the How To Get Involved pages.

Once you are a borrower you can then sign up to the Book Group proper. The cost for a one year membership is £10/£5. Your membership fee helps cover the costs of the Book Group for which we currently do not have another source of funding.

You can attend your first meeting for free to try it out - after this membership is payable and is renewed annually.

The Book Group offers members: the loan of books apart from the occasional self-sourced book decided by the group, a welcoming environment, tea and coffee, email updates and group facilitation.

Books are distributed at each meeting to members, with spare copies left for collection in the Library. After reading, books can either be left at the Library, or returned to any Glasgow City Council public library.

This group is free to Friends of GWL.

Satellite & Pop-Up Library Collections

Satellite libraries are remote collections, a "mini women's library" from our Glasgow-based collection, consisting of books, magazines, DVDs and other materials. They can be adapted in size and content to suit a wide range of interests and reading levels and can be installed anywhere in Scotland. We currently have satellite collections in Dumfries, Inverness and Cornton Vale women's prison.

We can also offer temporary 'pop up libraries' to support events or exhibitions. These are a great way to give people a flavour of what we have on offer in the library. We've run pop-up libraries at the Tramway and CCA in Glasgow, and the Generator Projects Art Gallery in Dundee.

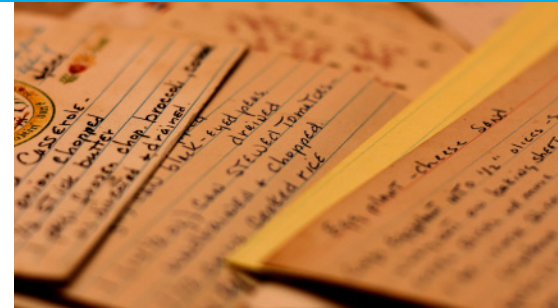

Women's Heritage Walks

Our Women Make History group launched Glasgow's first Women's Heritage Walk in June 2007 as part of the West End Festival programme. Since then, we have expanded our range of guided walks for the general public to include trails in the Merchant City, Garnethill, Glasgow Necropolis and walks on specific themes and for specific groups. We will also be launching our East End walk later this year.

The walks always prove to be very popular and book up quickly, so we have other ways you can take part if you are unable to get booked on.

Margaret Tait: Poetry and Film Friday 3rd and Saturday 4th August at The CCA

As poet, artist and above all filmmaker Margaret Tait realised her vision of the world across many of the artificial boundaries in the arts. Join Glasgow Women's Library in a celebration of her work. This event has been made possible with support from CCA Glasgow

Margaret Tait: Film Poet Saturday 4th August, 4.30pm

Margaret Tait died April 16th 1999, aged 80. She was an intensely private person with a unique vision, firmly rooted in her native Orkney.

Glasgow Women's Library, working with filmmakers Marissa Keating and Michael Jones, went on a journey to document the story of this elusive filmmaker and poet through her friends, family, and peers. Join us for the premiere of that work.

Poems, Stories and Writings Book Launch Saturday 4th August, 7pm

Margaret Tait was a pioneering filmmaker for whom words and images made the world real. In 'documentary', she wrote, real things 'lose their reality ...and there's no poetry in that. In poetry, something else happens.' If film, for Tait, was a poetic medium, her poems are works of craft and observation that are generous and independent in their vision of the world, poems that make seeing happen.

In this book Sarah Neely, Lecturer in Film at the University of Stirling, draws on Tait's three poetry collections, her book of short stories, her magazine articles and unpublished notebooks to make available for the first time a collection of the full range of Tait's writing.

Join us for the Glasgow launch of this collection with some familiar faces reading the work and an introduction from Sarah Neely.



Blue Black Permanent Friday 3rd August, 7pm & Saturday 4th August, 2pm

A very rare opportunity to see Margaret Tait's debut film, *Blue Black Permanent*, twenty years after its release. A haunting and magical film about a daughter's attempts to come to terms with her mother's mysterious death. This is a delicate and poetic work of intense emotion.

Glasgow Women's Library is part of a cluster of 4 organisations (Move On, Amina the Muslim Women's Resource Centre, and Diversity Films) working together to develop exciting and innovative volunteering programmes which benefit volunteers as well as the work of these charities.

The volunteering opportunities change regularly and can include: covering reception, helping with research, befriending vulnerable people, being a mentor for a young person, providing literacy and numeracy support and much more!

Joining and Booking How do I book an event?

To attend an event or course we ask you to join the Library: this is really easy to do and is completely FREE! Just complete a form to receive your borrowers card and we will post this out to you. Forms can be completed online, or you can call in & see us to fill one out. Joining gives you a unique GWL number that you can then use to register on events.

Do I need to pay?

While a lot of our events are free, we do ask for a small contribution towards some of our learning events. Where you see prices listed against an event these generally fall under two categories: Full Price for people who feel that they can afford to pay a small amount to attend events and want to contribute to the library's work, and Subsidised Rates (usually free) for students, people on a low income, unemployed or in receipt of benefits. We do not ask for

proof of this, it is done on a trust basis and you self-evaluate your situation.

GWL Friends can access all our learning programmes for free.

All the money we receive helps us to keep providing events and courses, and directly supports the work of Glasgow Women's Library.

Why is it important to book first?

It is important for us to know how many people to expect at all events as this affects the spaces we use and how many staff and biscuits and teabags we need! It is also important so that we can ensure you have all the details you need about an event, especially if there are any last minute changes. It is also just as important for you to cancel a place in advance if you can't attend as we often have waiting lists. So don't let someone miss out on an event they would have loved to attend, give us a call.
