GLASGOW WOMEN'S LIBRARY IS NO ORDINARY LIBRARY

It is unique in Scotland and a national treasure! Glasgow Women's Library (GWL) celebrates the lives and achievements of women and champions their contributions to Scotland's culture. Our vibrant information hub is open to all. An Accredited Museum and home to a lending library and archive, GWL also offers exciting events, activities and courses through its various learning programmes linked to its collections.

JOINING AND BOOKING

How do I join the library?

Joining the library is really easy to do and is completely FREE! Complete a form at GWL or join online.

How do I book an event?

You can book through our website, in person at GWL, or call or email us.

Do I need to pay?

Most GWL events are free. Where events do have a booking fee we have two rates: Full Price (people who feel that they can afford to attend events and want to support our work), and Subsidised (usually free) for students, people on

a low income, unemployed people or people in receipt of benefits. We do not ask for proof of this. GWL Friends also access all our events at a subsidised rate.

Why is it important to book first?

It is important for us to know how many people to expect at all events as this affects the spaces we use and how many staff, biscuits and teabags we need! We can also contact you if there are any last minute changes. It's important to cancel a place if you can't attend as we have waiting lists. If you have any questions about this or anything else you read in the programme please contact us.

GREEN WAYS TO GET TO BRIDGETON

Our Environmental Policy sets out how we aim to reduce our carbon emissions, including supporting our visitors to travel by foot, bike or public transport.

By bike: We are on one of the city's best cycle routes which follows the Clyde, to the East and the West. You can hop on a Next Bike for £1 per 30 minutes and return it to the docking station round the corner.

Women Who Widnae Haud Their Wheesht in World War One

What compelled thousands of women of Glasgow and Manchester to voice their protest and march to proclaim their antipathy in 1916 and 1918?

Through talks, discussion and film we will explore the commonalities of experience between women in these two cities and learn about pioneering peace activism during WWI. The event, led by the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom will refer to and draw upon **FORWARD: Remembering Women's Peace Crusaders**, an exhibition at GWL in 2016.

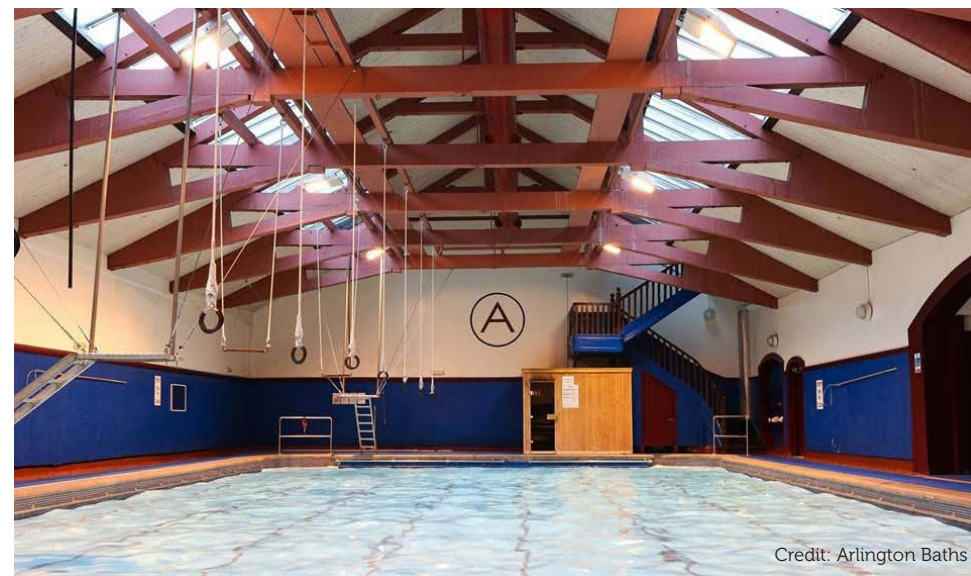

Enjoy inspiring stories of the pioneers of women's sport in the Arlington Baths Club, a beautiful Victorian swimming pool with a unique Turkish Bath, where women have been swimming since 1872.

[Jenny Landreth](#), author of [Swell: A Waterbiography](#) and The Guardian swimming blog, will take us through the story of the determined women who demanded equal rights in the water, threw off their restrictive costumes, and became Olympic champions.

GWL will showcase objects from our collections related to sporting women; from 19th century women who found freedom through cycling, to the 2014 Commonwealth Games and today's fast-growing female-dominated sport of roller derby. Join us for a tour of the Baths at 6pm.

GWL have teamed up with **Document Human Rights Film Festival** to present **Grab and Run** by **Roser Corella**.

There's a Kyrgyz saying that every good marriage starts with tears. Over half the marriages in Kyrgyzstan begin with kidnapping, a practice commonly known as Ala-kachuu, which could be translated as 'grab and run'. A group of men capture a woman on the street and drag her to her new "home", where preparations for a wedding are underway.

This shocking film provides a close-up look at a tradition that demonstrates that women in Kyrgyzstan are still seen as men's trophies.

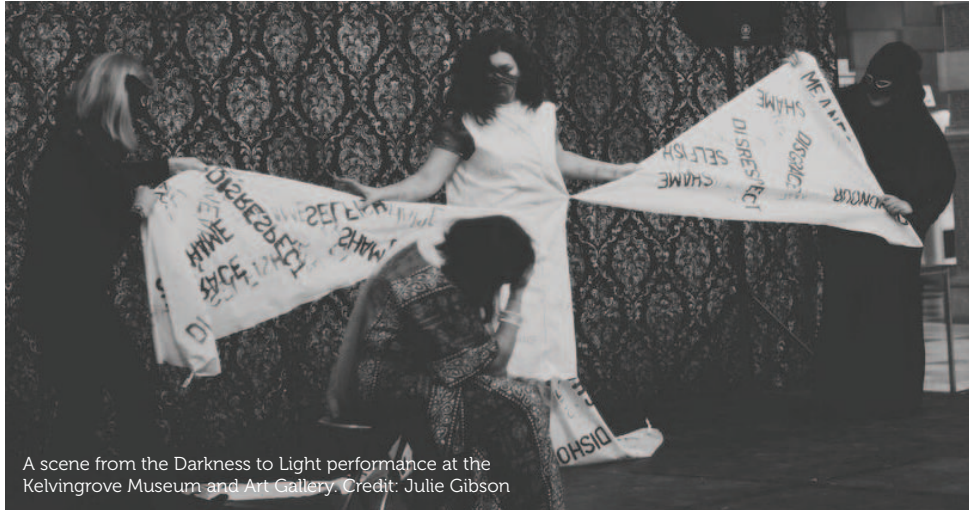

As the war reaches the most distant villages the two friends Florence and Nyasha join the fighters and assume new names: Flame and Liberty. But the war is not as easy as they thought.

Her Spirit Soared

Thursday 30th November, 6pm to 8.30pm, Tramway, 16+

As part of **16 Days of Action Opposing Violence Against Women**, we present Her Spirit Soared: Stories of survival and hope from women moving on from abuse.

This drama project was facilitated with women's groups from Glasgow Southside, who were new to performance. Participants adapted their own journeys of oppression to triumph, desperation to liberation into an evocative drama first performed to a packed Kelvingrove Museum earlier this year. Darkness, abuse and turmoil is transformed, through the women's own strength, into a place of light and peace.

Interviews in the Video Data Bank

Thursday 7th December, 6pm to 7.30pm

Kaisa Lassinaro and uh books present an evening of screenings and readings as a contribution to the less known history of women artists' practices at the inception of the media arts movement in America. **Laura Guy**, **Kaisa Lassinaro** and **Emmie McLuskey** discuss the work of artists including Laurie Anderson, Vanalyne Green, Barbara Kruger, Lucy Lippard and Martha Rosler, whose work continues to influence contemporary art.

The event draws upon artist interviews conducted from 1974–84 by Lyn Blumenthal and Kate Horsfield, co-founders of the **Video Data Bank**. The thoughtful answers given by interviewees at early stages of their practice share their lives and work in ways that are both surprising and enlightening and reveal the development of each artist's trajectory.

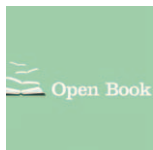
