
Over the years I have worked with diverse women's groups across Glasgow with the focus of connecting the women with the learning at the library. Some groups are made up of women who have settled in Scotland for many years while others are new migrants including those from the refugee communities.

Some are hard to reach women who are facing isolation, some have language barriers while others have more complex needs. We try our best to develop programmes to meet the needs of all women we work with.

and travelling exhibition.



 At the launch event we invited families of the women involved, local councillors and local community organisations. Women were presented with a free copy of the publication. The women said that this was the first time they truly felt their story was valued and celebrated. The books were also distributed throughout the Glasgow libraries thus adding positively to the Arts and Culture Sector.



 This is the Model House Reminiscence project where we worked with women from South Asian countries to share their stories of home and how they lived before migrating to Scotland. Then they worked with a local artist to build their house and as result were introduced to new arts techniques working with wood, clay and leather carvings. The house has become an exhibition item which often gets loaned out and currently displayed at our Mezzanine floor of the women's library.



Over the past year we have under taken new and exciting ventures which has
taken us to another level. For example our new initiative called Collect:if - a
network bringing together for the first time Women of Color Creatives based in
Scotland. We provide a safe and private space for the members to meet quarterly
where they can share information, support one another and also help us diversify
the GWL collection. We keep them informed with monthly newsletter and a FB
page where they can continue to share and collaborate out with the network
meetings.



• Last Year Collect:if members hosted one of the GWL Legendary Herland events where Women of Colour called all the shots, took to the stage and showcased some of the best in performance in Music, dance, spoken word and food!



Another project that has really taken off is Creative Writing for Muslim women
with our national partners - The University of Sheffield. It all started from a few
years ago where a handful of Muslim women wanting to start a book group AND
now moving onto creative writing such as play writing, blogging, writing for fiction
and more. It is also amazing to see the transition of these women who are now
engaging in various literature events.



We have also tapped into some of our Collect:if members who are emerging and established writers to facilitate these workshops. The writings produced by the group will be included in an anthology of Muslim women's writing.

We will be organising a celebratory event in September showcasing the amazing writings created by the women



Another great achievement in this past year was the Her Sprit Soared Theatre play which was performed during 16 days of action violence against women. This play tells true stories of local women moving on from abuse. Again BME communities rarely take part in the performing arts sector and project achieved many positive outcomes.

The workshops were carefully planned to ensure women were able to take part in all aspects of project from storyboarding, script writing, creating props with local artists and performing on stage

Committed to Equality,

This project a great piece of integration work bringing together women from diverse backgrounds and from all walks of life - from local women, survivors of abuse, amateur actors and a few professionals and even a GWL board member.

This was the first time we got local BME women to perform on stage in front of 300 people – something they never dreamt of.



"I am glad I took part. I wanted people to understand my feelings when I felt at my lowest. At first I thought I wouldn't be able to perform on stage as it would bring back bad memories, however I was supported well by all the women involved"

This project also allowed me to explore my own creative interest in theatre work, in particular stage direction is where my strength lies apparently! We received amazing feedback. People were especially curious about how came up with the creativity process. They said we should definitely tour the play around Scotland and nationally! We are currently looking into funding to make this happen.



As I mentioned in the past year there has been a rise in our work with national partners.

We are thrilled to be working with the House of Commons to undertake an arts project exploring the impact of the race relations act in the UK. We have the London based artist Scarlett running a series of workshops with the BME women's group. She is also running a workshop today in the events space and will be happy to say hello. We are excited that the art works produced at these workshops will be exhibited at the House of Commons alongside art works produced by other cities
