A WARM WELCOME

Since its inception in 1991 our library has been collecting and preserving women's history. We have grown from an unfunded, grassroots group into a renowned heritage resource that supports and unites women locally, nationally and internationally. This season sees the Three Decades of Changing Minds project take its next steps in exploring the GWL origin story and you're invited! We will be delving further into the archive and sharing the institutional knowledge we've captured over the last 4 months, using our archive as a tool for inciting memories and a framework for looking at the present and future; looking back to move forward.

In true GWL style we have been capturing institutional knowledge in our Working Memory Space sessions with founders and early instigators. Materials on display have prompted detailed and unique accounts of what it was like in the early days, weaving a thread between the physical materials, the context, both personal and cultural, and our organisation.

The sessions have highlighted not just our accomplishments but the challenges we faced too; the reality of running a space without central heating in cold Glasgow winters as well as meeting the expectations and needs of the GWL community. All balanced with the responsibility of running a safe space for women in sometimes quite dangerous areas. We've asked questions about the early volunteering and work, how it felt to be part of GWL at that time, how that was supported financially and logistically, the fundraising/parties(!) and the wider community of women uniting both locally and globally around GWL.

With all this to share, we look forward to seeing you at our Working Memory Space exhibition launch in September as well as the open archive later in the year. We hope these events can act as a spark for your own memories of GWL, whether from the early nineties or from earlier this year.

Action from our archive will be accompanied by our usual packed programme of workshops, exhibitions, reading and writing events. Take a dive and see what sparks your imagination.

Three contingents were quickly trained and mobilized – a prelude to the famous Literacy Campaign the following year. In these fascinating short films, volunteer teachers talk about their experiences, motivations, challenges and the social and political context of that exceptional time.

Followed by Q&A with filmmakers Magia López Cabrera and Lusmila Lamothe Lafargue.



Dialogo Con Mi Abuela / Conversation With My Grandmother

Gloria Rolando focuses on the cross-sections of African and Caribbean roots of Cuban culture. This documentary invites us into the everyday life of her grandmother Inocencia – a Cuban woman of African descent born in 1906.

Through a 1993 recorded interview, Rolando shows her grandmother's relationship with poetry, nature, Syncretic Spiritism and Congolese traditions that are widespread throughout Cuba. Her grandmother details a time marked by severe racial discrimination and violence against African descendants.



Recovering Lost Women's Voices: The 17th-century manuscript letters of Marie Stewart, Countess of Mar


Thursday 17th November, 2pm to 3:30pm, Online Talk and Q&A, Free




Maud Sulter: Service to Empire

Looking back to move forward



GWL Origin Stories Display

Our GWL Origin Stories display explores key points in our grassroots beginnings through archival materials and oral history interviews with GWL's founders and early instigators Adele Patrick, Kate Henderson and Sue John. GWL's precursor, 'Women in Profile' was established to counter a male-centric cultural narrative about Glasgow's arts and cultural landscape in the year leading up to Glasgow's European City of Culture status in 1990. Glasgow Women's Library's first archive and library space opened in Garnethill initially to preserve the work of 'Women in Profile' and a year of women's artistic contributions to the city. We look back on this time as a period of GWL's history that has been previously undocumented.

Come on a journey with us inside GWL, 'looking back to look forward', as we discover how it was all made possible.



The book also includes a chapter on the need for better visibility of and attention to women artists by GWL co-founder **Adele Patrick**.




Vanessa Baird: New Works




The Caretakers

GLASGOW WOMEN'S LIBRARY IS NO ORDINARY LIBRARY

Unique in Scotland and a national treasure! Glasgow Women's Library (GWL) celebrates the lives and achievements of women and champions their contributions to Scotland's culture. Our welcoming and wonderful information hub is open to all. An Accredited Museum and home to a lending library and archive, GWL also offers exciting events, activities and courses through its various learning programmes linked to its collections.

JOINING AND BOOKING

How do I join the library?

Joining the library is really easy to do and is completely FREE! Complete a form at GWL or join online.

How do I book an event?

You can book through our website, in person at GWL, or call or email us. Since March 2020 we have moved online to host many of our events on zoom and, since re-opening, we continue to offer online events as well as in person gatherings at GWL. If you have never accessed a zoom event, don't worry; we provide email guidance ahead of the event and support once you're in the room.

Do I need to pay?

For most GWL events, there are two ticket options: a £2 ticket and a Free ticket. If a ticket price of £2 is in any way a barrier to you attending this event please choose a Free ticket. If we don't offer Free tickets for an event, this is because the event raises funds for the Library or a partner organisation, or because the costs associated with this event mean that our prices are slightly higher than our usual events. In these instances, please choose the ticket which you feel most able to pay. We offer our Friends Free tickets or the lower ticket price.

Why is it important to book first?

It is helpful for us to know how many people to expect at events as this affects the spaces we use. If you book, we can also get in touch if there are any last minute changes. Please cancel a booked place if you can no longer attend, as we do often have waiting lists.

How has the library changed to be Covid safe?

There is no longer a legal requirement to wear face coverings indoors in public buildings in Scotland.

However, as we continue to prioritise the health, safety and comfort of our visitors, volunteers and staff, and in line with continued guidance, we ask that:

All visitors, volunteers and staff continue to wear face coverings when moving around the building. Face coverings can be removed when seated socially distanced at 1 metre from one another. While in the building, people should continue to observe social distancing of 1 metre. There will be plenty of hand sanitiser around the building and we have enhanced cleaning measures in place. When you visit, our team will be on hand to answer any questions and provide any help you need to feel reassured and welcome at GWL. We ask that if you feel unwell with any Covid-19 symptoms that you do not visit the Library.

GREEN WAYS TO GET TO BRIDGETON

Our Environmental Policy sets out how we aim to reduce our carbon emissions, including supporting our visitors to travel by foot, bike or public transport.

By bike: We are on one of the city's best cycle routes which follows the Clyde, and we have a bike shelter. You can hop on a Next Bike for £1 per 30 minutes and return it to the docking station round the corner.

By public transport: Take advantage of the great public transport links to Bridgeton: low level trains from Glasgow Central station take 10 minutes. Bellgrove Rail Station is a 10 minute walk away connecting visitors from Edinburgh and Queen Street Low Level. Buses 18, 46, 64 and 263 stop at the end of our street.

On foot: We're a 30 minute walk from the city centre.
